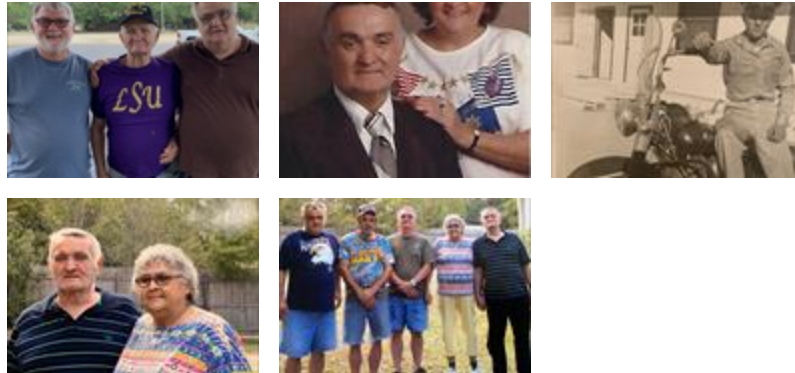

“ As his name sake (Leroy C. Hebert, Jr) every time I write my name I will think of him. I have a life time of memories. As a father to 5 boys, he had his hands full. A mechanic by trade he always had tools at the house. He taught us what a crescent wrench, a pair of pliers, and a Phillips screwdriver was. He may have regretted that when some of his tools disappeared. He taught me how to drive a car, It was a 3 speed stick shift on the steering column (definitely something you only see in museums). When I was having problems in school at an early age I remember him helping me. We always had a roof over our heads and food on the table, because of him. He taught me how to ride a bicycle. At 65 years old I still enjoy riding a bike today with a group of friends. He called me on the phone one time and after hearing how I pronounce my last name, he left a phone message. Son don't you know your own name anymore? I live in Ohio so I just go by the way our last name sounds versus the way it is pronounced in Louisiana, which is Abear. (which is a cajun French pronunciation). So we worked out an agreement where when I'm in La. it is Abear. So many memories. I will miss you Dad
